WHEREAS; a man of many talents, Dr. Jones was a certified pilot, gifted chess master, avid swimmer and lifeguard, black belt in Tae Kwon Do, and possessed a keen aptitude for politics and civil rights, always remaining involved in local, state, and federal affairs; and

WHEREAS; a leader, mentor, and inspiration to many, Dr. Jones will be remembered for his wisdom and willingness to support and uplift others, and the impact of his contributions will continue to live on for generations to come;

### Executive Proclamation

*WHEREAS*, Dr. Jerrel W. Jones, a Milwaukee journalism trailblazer and bold leader in our community and beyond, passed from this life at the age of 85 on June 5, 2025; and

WHEREAS, Dr. Jones launched the Milwaukee Courier in 1964, later adding the Milwaukee Star and Racine Courier, and eventually winning the Russwurm Award, the most prestigious and highest award of the National Newspaper Publishers Associations' (NNPA); and

*WHEREAS*, active in the Civil Rights Movement from its onset, Dr. Jones was instrumental in political campaigns from local offices to the presidency for decades, generously sharing his insight and perspective with leaders from the business sector and civil and social organizations alike; and

WHEREAS, in the 1970s, Dr. Jones expanded his company beyond print to the airwaves, purchasing WNOV 860 AM, becoming the first Black owner of a newspaper and radio station in the United States and later adding a simulcast of 106.5 FM, and was one of the first to give airtime to Marvin Gaye's album "What's Going On," as well as promoting the art of thousands of Black artists who were unable to break into mainstream markets; and

*WHEREAS*, Dr. Jones continued supporting Milwaukee County's Black community by producing the Negro Business Directory, as well as working in conjunction with the state to publish Wisconsin Tourism Guides until 1990; and

WHEREAS, a true renaissance man, Dr. Jones somehow also found time among his impressive professional ventures to pursue his many passions, including earning his pilot's license, becoming a nationally and internationally recognized chess master, being an avid swimmer, and achieving a black belt in Tae Kwon Do; and

*WHEREAS*, Milwaukee County extends sincerest condolences to the loved ones of Dr. Jerrell W. Jones, an essential figure in Milwaukee's political and media landscape and a trailblazer for civil rights and equality for Black Milwaukeeans, whose leadership and presence will be deeply missed; now, therefore



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### Dr. Jerrel W. Jones: Life and Legacy

Dr. Jerrel W. Jones was born in Milwaukee, Wisconsin in 1939. He was raised by his mother Mary Ellen Shadd Strong, his father, Jesse Jones and step-father Lawrence Shadd. He spent his childhood in Milwaukee, Oshkosh and Racine. He attended North Division High School in Milwaukee. During his high school years, he also worked various jobs including lifeguarding. Soon after high school he married and started a family.

Growing up, he was exposed to business ownership through his mother and step-father. His mother began her life as a serial entrepreneur by publishing the Milwaukee Defender newspaper and the Wisconsin Negro Business Directory. His step-father owned a number of businesses including a movie theater and grocery store. Influenced by their successes, he began publishing the Milwaukee Courier Newspaper in 1964.

The Milwaukee Courier quickly became known for its award-winning editorial integrity and bravery. The Courier was also known as a training ground for journalists who would become lauded locally and nationally.

In 1972, his company Courier Communications purchased WNOV Radio Station from the Chess brothers, thus making him the first Black man in the United States to own both a newspaper and a radio station.

In addition to the Milwaukee Courier and WNOV, he operated several other businesses throughout his life which included other newspapers (The Milwaukee Star and the Racine Courier), directories (Negro Business Directory in 1965 and Wisconsin Tourism Directories throughout the 1980's and 1990's.), a magazine (Black Family Magazine), a lounge (the Towne House) and real estate in Wisconsin, Illinois and Georgia.

Throughout his life and career, he was also heavily involved and influential in the political world. He strongly impacted local, statewide and presidential campaigns for six decades. In addition to his business and political accomplishments, he was also a master chess player who won national and international matches, a black belt in Tae Kwon Do and he also pursued his pilot license.

Jones often credited his success to

his role models and support system. He would say that Earnestine Jones, his wife of 66 years, is most responsible for these accomplishments and his longevity. A close second was his mother, fathers, 15 uncles and his mentors, S.B. Fuller and Dr. Carlton Goodlet. He would also cite the many teachers throughout his life and, of course, all of the people who worked with and for him over the past six decades.

Dr. Jerrel W. Jones leaves a legacy of resiliency, generosity, bravery and ingenuity that is unmatched.

There are times that the words flow freely when writing about someone you know and have known for more than five (5) decades. That has not been the case when I have struggled to say goodbye to a friend, a real friend.

I met Jerrel when we were both young Black newspaper publishers. I had become publisher of the Crusader newspapers upon the death of my husband in 1968, and he had become publisher of the Milwaukee Courier being inspired by his moth-


er, Mary Ellen Shadd. He had a lot of nerve because his mother was a tough act to follow. Her reputation as a savvy businesswoman was well known around the country, Chicago included.

Little did I know that the apple did not fall far from the tree. It was around 1970 when I first met Jerrel. It was a National Newspaper Publishers Association (NNPA) meeting on the west coast. He came with several associates and employees, all young like him and already exhibiting innovative ideas and running a successful publication. It was at an outing to the Grand Canyon that Jerrel found out I had a real fear of flying. By the time we deplaned at the Grand Canyon he needed to dry the arm of his shirt which I had held tightly as my hand sweated profusely on the small airplane, and we found ourselves seat mates on the flight.

Before the end of the conference, we found ourselves joined by another young publisher named William (Bill) Lee, publisher of the Sacramento Observer in Sacramento, California.

By Thursday evening of the conference we sat by the pool disillusioned and wondering if we would have an opportunity to fully participate in the organization. You see, we were all leaders, and we thought we could contribute something to an established organization of outstanding and well-known publishers.

Before we left the pool that evening it seemed the established and well-known publishers decided to pick one of the three of us for a fast-track leadership position. They decided that the young publisher to be elevated in NNPA would be *Continued on page 21*

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



# The Evolution of Journalism in Print Media



The history of journalism spans the growth of technology and trade, marked by the advent of specialized techniques for gathering and disseminating, information on a regular basis that caused, as one history of journalism surmises, the steady increase of "the scope of news available to us and the speed with which it is transmitted". Before the printing press was invented word of mouth was the primary news source.

The word-of-mouth transmission of news was highly unreliable and died out with the invention of the printing press.

Newspapers (and to a lesser extent, magazines) have been the primary medium of journalists since the 18th century.

The Milwaukee Courier used Cold type typesetters, who could type the text without worrying about the letter spacing, save copy to a tape drive and print out later, and other similar not-quite-computing advantages.

As the body text process improved, so did the process for producing headlines, ad text, and so on. There were a variety of machines that used photo-negative fonts, with lenses to change sizes, to create headlines,

#### and such.

The computing industry was beginning to blossom, and it went from paper tape with holes to floppy disks, to building phototypesetting that calculated lines. Most newspapers used their dark room, the Milwaukee Courier advanced to using a dark room.

In the past 60 years technology has improved with the transmission of news and the Milwaukee Courier has continued to advance with the times, Informing the Milwaukee community and its readers.

Milwaukee Courier continues to be known as "The Newspaper You Can Trust".

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

### A Conversation With Founder Jerrel Jones, a Visionary, Activist and Maverick 60+ Years-Strong

We sat down with living legend Jerrel W. Jones, a civil rights warrior and unparalleled media pioneer, in celebration of a 60 year long and meaningful career. A Milwaukee native, and recipient of a 2022 honorary doctor of humane letters degree from Cardinal Stritch University, Jones' largest looming accomplishment is the founding of historical Black newspaper, Milwaukee Courier.

While Jones is modest about his legacy, his 60 years of activism have been integral to the civil rights of black americans. The impact of Mr. Jones' work and influence cannot be understated. Through his leadership of the Milwaukee Courier and WNOV, he helped develop multimedia communications industry professionals in Milwaukee and Wisconsin, Many within the African-American community have long recognized that the Milwaukee Courier and WNOV give voice to their culture. The Courier went on to earn the prestigious Russurm Award presented by the National Newspaper Association (NNPA).

Given his strong presence in the Black community over the last six decades, he has played a major role in shaping politics and culture. Mr. Jones' interest in print media came from his mother, Dr. Mary Ellen Strong, who owned the Milwaukee Defender weekly newspaper — the only newspaper "of and by" the African-American community during her time. When asked why it's important to continue the tradition of Black news by and for Black people Jones passionately expresses how often the majority mainstream media can become clouded in ignorance, both willfully and otherwise.

He noticed how often Black people were the subject of scrutiny in news media, while rarely being the commentators. "We are the news. We are everywhere, in everything." he declares definitively. "We need to be

the ones to tell our stories."

Jones knew from a young age if he wanted to do something right he'd have to do it himself. As soon as he garnered readers, he used his influence for political campaigns from local offices to the presidency for *Continued on page 22*

Jerrel Jones. Quickly he was elected 1st vice president and shorty after serving as vice president he decided to run for president. Not so fast young man the elders seemed to say as his campaign was not successful. While he never became President he continued to participate and support others. Bill Lee, a real suave and articulate publisher, never became the head of NNPA and frankly told me that he did not believe that I could win. Jerrel supported me in 1995 when I ran for President, and I won. I cannot recall any time that I called on Jerrell that he did not respond positively.

When I naively sought to host the convention in Gary, Indiana in 1983 Jerrel was my supporter. He traveled to Gary in a first-of-its-kind-ever Sight Selection Committee and NNPA publishers came to Gary that year. It was a nearly two-year fight, and Jerrel did not falter or fail me in my desire to host the convention.

When he did not actively support me personally, he urged Carole Geary, his trusted associate to work and support me, representing the Milwaukee Courier.

We fought many other battles for the good of the Black Press. It is hard to often find such support from anyone, but as I titled this tribute Jerrel was A REAL FRIEND!! Leavell and Imogene Harris, host publishers and was challenged by NNPA officials. Gary city officials gave strong support and welcomed the committee. The Committee unanimously recommended that Gary, Indiana was indeed suitable to host the 1983 convention.

Continued from page 19 decades, and shared his insight and perspective with leaders from every business sector and civic and social organization. This attitude is emblematic of his paper's motto, 'The newspaper you can trust'. He wanted to impact his community with the plain and simple truth.

Despite maintaining print through the rise of electronic distribution, Jones is not opposed to the use of technology in his reporting, stating the effect of the internet in news is simply evolution. "We used to paint on rocks."

Jones embraces a lot about the new age of news media, however he does feel we've strayed from core values on a global scale. While frustrations with outlets more for profits than meaningful impact or sharing the truth with the general population are not unfounded, he still has hope for the next generation of young and hungry Black journalists around the country, "We make the world go round. Don't let them tell you you don't."
